Upon this Rock...

t. Rose has stood proudly as an historic landmark in Cherry Grove Township for the past 133 years. Those of you who farm in this area know that deep beneath this rich


dark top soil lies limestone. In fact, all throughout southeastern Minnesota you will find limestone ledges as you travel into valleys.

The Irish who immigrated to this area in the 1800's chose to settle in Cherry Grove Township for its diversity and selected a high point in the township to build St. Rose. This church was a true testament to their faith in this new land of opportunity. St. Rose is located at an elevation of 1,210 feet. Many of you may have noticed that the land surrounding St. Rose gently slopes down hill in every direction. The elevation of Rochester is 989 feet above sea level and if you look far beyond the parking area you can actually see the wind turbines located 17 miles due south between Dodge Center and Hayfield.

It seems most fitting that we recently rediscovered the following scripture passage on the south wall of the sanctuary while restoring

the trompe l'oeil imagery; "Thou art Peter and upon this rock I will build my Church." The pioneer parishioners who settled here built St. Rose with their own hands using limestone quarried from the Thomas O'Kane farm located 1.2 miles to the east. The stone mason was Samuel Tunks and both men are laid to rest in the cemetery at St. Rose. The quality of this limestone and their skilled craftsmanship have certainly withstood the test of time.

We hope that our preservation efforts would please these early settlers. We thank the many volunteers and the incredibly generous financial supporters for making this all possible and for believing that this piece of history is worth preserving.



We fondly remember these pioneers during our annual events and have celebrated new memories with many more weddings throughout the past year. This has placed interior restoration projects, such as restoring the sacristy, as high priorities. We also celebrated the return of the original pump organ and continue to make progress with the ongoing trompe l'oeil restoration.

Exterior restoration last year included new cedar shingles on the entrance enclosure as well as the completion of what we

refer to as 'phase one' of steeple restoration. You can see in this photo that wooden louvers and lattice were installed at the base level. A cross will return to the top of the spire and bring the steeple back to its original splendor.

As we've mentioned before, the most labor intensive project we face is tuck pointing. Most of the facade is in stable condition but closer inspection revealed that many areas are also in critical need of repair. We plan to address these critical areas first to ensure stability and make additional tuck pointing repairs as funding allows.

Our board wishes to recognize the many contributions of Bonnie Lemmerman as our Treasurer and her dedication while serving on our Board of Directors. Bonnie will be greatly missed and continues to actively volunteer. We thank Carol Nelson for filling the position of Treasurer.

We hope you enjoy the following pages of this newsletter. May our efforts continue to provide opportunities to experience this unique historical landmark with future generations.


### Annual Events



## Trompe L'oeil Restoration



ertain projects demand artistic skills which very few people possess. When you consider the number of people who are this skilled and willing to volunteer such talent, the number becomes much smaller. Helen Distad is the uniquely qualified and generous individual who has been quietly and methodically restoring trompe l'oeil to the walls and ceiling of St. Rose.

This realistic imagery creates an optical illusion that makes objects appear in three dimensions as you can see in these photos. We are impressed and amazed at what Helen has restored thus far.

Helen carefully documented the graphic elements found throughout the church and is restoring history to the interior walls and ceiling.














The preparation often includes painting an area white first to allow the correct colors to be revealed as shown in the photos to the left.




## Steeple Restoration



1.) cross will return to the top of the spire as we move on to 'phase two' of steeple restoration. This major project has been one of our toughest challenges to face. Fortunately, we have many talented volunteers to thank for the progress we continue to accomplish.

The photos below show the extent of need for repair and include a view to the east from inside the bell tower.





3.) he lattice and louvers were part of 'phase one' which took all summer to accomplish and included several steps. It was time for primer and paint once Myron finished the assembly.

Jerry Vettel is shown delivering the pieces and John Palof is shown oil priming and painting the lattice and louvers using a

paint sprayer. Two top coats will keep the tower in good condition for years to come.









2.) ho would have guessed fifty years ago when Myron Schettl planted white pine saplings that he would be harvesting these trees for St. Rose? Myron Schettl of Shady Haven Tree Farms generously donated the lumber and assembled both the lattice and the louvers from trees he not only planted, but also harvested, milled, and dried. It's worth noting that he planted these trees at the same time St. Rose was closed.

4.) Vo one but Marv Bronner knows how many days were spent clearing out debris and making structural repairs inside the bell tower. These pictures reveal the



moment all his efforts became visible to the outside world. Marv also discovered interesting relics such as the original 1896 shipping tags for the bell itself and a board with the words 'Spring Creek' hand written in pencil.





## Aspiring Keights

ow that the twelve pre-built sections of lattice and louvers are built and installed, it's time to begin working on the outside trim details of the spire. Jerry Vettel is the brave soul who was lifted high up inside the bucket to take measurements and see how our first attempt at the arches looked. Many minute adjustments will need to be made as we calculate the

subtle variations on each side of the tower. New lumber is needed for both the siding and decorative elements and will be primed and painted to match existing trim. Our goal is to have the bell portion completed this summer.

The most difficult task will be replacing the cross that once belonged on top of the spire. We estimate that this cross was five feet tall and four feet across with the top extending an incredible sixty feet above the ground.

This entire project will involve a tremendous amount of scaffolding and possibly a crane to install the cross. We also plan to work on the shingles and make necessary repairs to the spire while we are up there.



# Entance Roof Restoration



Marv Bronner and Mike Prescher discuss how to approach this project. The five different roof sections required several calculations before they could cut the multiple angles involved. This seemingly small entrance roof covers nearly 200 square feet and required over seven bundles of #1 cedar shingles.



he entrance roof was replaced last summer with grant money provided by Operation Round-Up through Goodhue County Cooperative Electric.

Old photographs suggest that this entry was built in the 1920's. New cedar shingles were installed to be historically correct and to match the church roof replaced in 2005. Mike Prescher is shown removing multiple layers of shingles including brittle asphalt underneath worn out cedar shingles. This revealed bead board still in good condition.

Careful planning, attention to detail, and a lot of patience was required to install the varying sizes of shingles. New felt underlayment was put down first and over seven bundles of #1 cedar shingles were needed to cover this roof. As shown in these photos, Jerry Vettel and Mike Prescher recycled the original ridge caps and repaired the leaking flat area in front of the fan shaped stained glass window.











## Original Pump Organ Returns

e are thrilled to announce the return of the original pump organ on June 7, 2010, thanks to Ed Bartelt and the help of many strong and determined volunteers.

The last Mass was held on June 4, 1961. Mrs. Bartelt eventually asked the priest if she could purchase the organ to practice for St. Paul's services at home. Father Campbell sold this for ten dollars and the organ has been in the care of the Bartelt family for nearly forty-nine years.

Jerry Vettel took the organ apart for a thorough cleaning and made repairs including the bellows pictured below. The organ was missing its keyboard cover until Jerry built a

> new one made of walnut and stained it to match the 130 year old instrument.

The original stool was also re-upholstered by Penny Vogelgesang and the cost donated by Bev Jacobsen. The organ was re-dedicated during the recent Candle Lighting.

hen we began this endeavor nine years ago, we never could have a relatively short amount of time. imagined how far we would come in such a relatively short amount of time. The physical labor and fund raising required seemed almost insurmountable. The single greatest reason we have achieved so much progress is that we are not alone in the mission to preserve St. Rose thanks to people like you. In the summer of 2002, our mailing list started with under 75 names and has grown to over 600 mailing addresses. The last 500+ came at the request of interested supporters who added their own names one at a time.

As many of you know, the progress at St. Rose has been made in great part by the efforts of tireless volunteers who freely give of their talents. We have been blessed by incredible financial support as well which has resulted in large restoration projects such as the new roof, electricity/lighting, heat pump furnace/air-conditioner, ceiling restoration, re-leading the stained glass windows and more.

It is still our goal to respect the integrity of this historic preservation with fiscal responsibility and shared vision as we look to the future of St. Rose. This includes communicating needs and researching options for grants and other fund raisers. We've also added a Paypal account which includes a new donation button on our web site at www.friendsofstrose.org.

Grants this past year included a grant from the Operation Round-Up program at Goodhue County Cooperative Electric for cedar shingles and another for outdoor lighting in 2011. A technology grant was also awarded through IBM for \$1,000. This grant allowed us to purchase hardware and software for administrative use.

We have several active projects in this newsletter such as tuck-pointing, steeple restoration, and interior restoration but there are many more needs.
